

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year C

Sunday Reflection

The miracle recounted in this Sunday's Gospel is an intriguing one, for it was, so to speak, an "unsolicited" miracle.

Whereas, when the paralysed man was cured, great efforts were made to lower him through the roof - to the place where Jesus stood—to beg for a miracle. Whereas, when the blind man was granted his sight, it was only after he repeatedly cried, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Whereas, at Cana in Galilee, it was Mary's heartfelt words, "they have no wine," which urged Jesus to compassionately respond. In the miracle recounted today, however, there is no such prior plea made to Jesus.

The miracle recounted today was one that was unasked for—one that was entirely a thought of Jesus Himself. It was intended to be a parable in action, not only meant as an act of love towards Peter, but also meant to leave him, the bystanders, and all who would hear of it, with an important lesson.

Let's recall what took place. According to Luke's account of the facts, Jesus instructs Peter to "put out into the deep water" and let down his nets for a catch. And yet Peter replies, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." This exchange makes us wonder, what could have been the reason for Peter's fruitless labour?

It certainly wasn't the time he went fishing—for the night is a very (some would say most) appropriate time to fish. It wasn't also a lack of skill on his part—for he had fished from his youth and understood the art through and through. Neither was it that he lacked any diligence in his efforts—for he laboured all night long.

So, what then was the reason for Peter's fruitless labour? Well, ultimately, we can say that his labour was fruitless, because the blessing of God was wanting. And when God's blessing is withdrawn, every human exertion is to no avail. For, as we read in the psalms, "unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labour in vain" (Ps 127:1).

It seems that in this case, God had decreed, that no matter how hard Peter and his fellow fishermen would try, on that night they would not catch any fish. This was not because God no longer loved or cared for Peter, but rather, because God was working to achieve something greater.

That is, despite the initial failure, by later performing the miracle of the miraculous catch of fish, Jesus would lead Peter to a knowledge of His own divinity; lead Peter to a greater humility and trust in Him; and also, by this miracle, signify the marvellous success Peter would later have in the evangelisation of souls, represented by these fish. God withdrew His blessing for a time, only to impart it more abundantly in a little while.

Situations similar to this may happen in our own lives. It may occur that our good God may seem to withdraw His blessing from us and our undertakings.

Of course, God's love for us is constant and can never be withdrawn. But it may seem at times that His love is absent, or He may at times withdraw His blessing from our labours, only because He is working to achieve a greater good by it. As in the case of Peter, He may be working to bring us to a realisation of a greater truth, or be encouraging us to trust Him more, or be helping us to increase in humility or some other virtue.

If, in our own lives it seems God is absent—we would do well to ponder what message God could be trying to convey to us? Is it, for instance, that our prayer life leaves much to be desired, or we have slowly left God out of our lives? And if so, by these trials, God could be trying to remind us of our need for Him in all our undertakings.

Could it be that our personal life leaves much to be desired in the way of virtue? And if so, God could be trying to draw us back on the straight and narrow. I mean, we should hardly be surprised if all our efforts and human prudence amounts to little if it is not our Lord who is "building the city."

But if, on the other hand, our conscience does not reprove us, and if like Peter, we have laboured diligently, as through a dark night, and our endeavours seem fruitless—we should not for this reason throw in the towel. Jesus may simply be withholding His blessing for a time, only to impart it later on with a more marvelous effect.

For do not crosses and afflictions forge virtue and earn for us eternal glory in heaven? Is not an apparent trial often the source of future blessings? In the extreme situation, is it not the persecution of tyrants, which brings about the glorification of the martyrs? We do not know the mind of the all-good God, but what we do know is that He is 100% good!

We know for sure that honest work, with an upright intention, done for Jesus, is never wasted. We may fail, our works may seem to fail—but these difficulties borne cheerfully on our part are like incense wafting up to heaven, bringing about a future blessing—in our own lives, or that of our neighbour—and certainly to our own crowning glory. For we have the assurance of God Himself, that "all things work together for good for those who love God" (Romans 8:28).

Despite his failings, we must admire Peter's humility and his docility to divine grace. When Jesus told him to let down his nets, he was already exhausted from the night's work and likely frustrated at his fruitless labour—and yet, he resignedly says, "Master ... if you say so, I will let down the nets." When Peter did not succeed at his work, we do not read of him becoming angry or breaking out into swear words and so on. What we do read of, however, is of his inspiring submissiveness to God's will, despite the present difficulties of his situation. A submissiveness and humility what won for him the divine blessing and gained for him great merit in the sight of God. So much so, that henceforth he would be commissioned to catch men.

May we be inspired to act likewise.

Jubilee Year 2025: Pilgrims of Hope

Pope Francis proclaimed 2025 a Jubilee Year for the whole Church, with the theme 'Pilgrims of Hope'. 2024 was declared a Year of Prayer in-preparation.

The 2025 Jubilee Year theme, *Spes Non Confundit* (*Hope Does Not Disappoint*), calls us to anchor our lives in the steadfast hope that comes from God.

Archbishop Patrick opened the Jubilee Year in the Archdiocese of Adelaide on 31st December 2024 at midnight Mass at the Cathedral. The Jubilee will end on 28 December 2025.

Three places within the Archdiocese of Adelaide are designated as pilgrimage sites for the Holy Year:

- A) St Francis Xavier's Cathedral in Adelaide
- B) St Joseph's Church in Penola
- C) St Aloysius' Church in Sevenhill

As one of the pilgrimage sites of the Holy Year, we will pray the Jubilee Prayer at all Sunday Masses.

Opportunities for prayer at each of the pilgrimage sites will be advertised throughout the year as well as occasions when the Papal Blessing with the plenary indulgence will be imparted.
